About Animals Fiji

WHO WE ARE

Animals Fiji is a registered Fiji and U.S. 501(c)(3) charity, established in 2011, focused on animal welfare across Fiji. We provide veterinary care for pets, livestock, and wildlife.

We operate four permanent clinics in Nadi, Lautoka, Savusavu, and Labasa, supported by mobile outreach services to underserved communities.

Our Nadi clinic also houses an adoption-guaranteed shelter for stray, injured, and abused animals, ensuring treatment and safe rehoming.

To reduce the epidemic of stray dog and cat populations that plague villages, towns and rural areas, through de-sexing (spay/neuter) programs.

To improve the welfare of all animals - domesticated & wildlife - resulting in better lives for both the animals and humans of Fiji, while helping to build a society without animal cruelty.

FUNDING

Animals Fiji is sustained through community donations and subsidised veterinary service fees.



Message from our Co-Founder

Ni sa Bula Vinaka,

2025 was a year of steady progress and strengthened partnerships. While we celebrate the milestones achieved, we remain clear-eyed about the work still ahead as we continue building a lifeline for animals across Fiji by improving communities for people, animals, and the environment alike.

In January, we marked an important milestone by transitioning our Labasa clinic from part-time operations to a fully staffed, full-time service after eight years of steady presence in the Northern Division. The continued use of our mobile clinic bus further expanded access to veterinary care, allowing us to reach communities that previously had limited support. In the final quarter of the year, we strengthened partnerships across government and the wider animal welfare community, including closer collaboration with the Ministry of Agriculture, who subsidized desexing services on behalf of the public. This collaboration, launched in Savusavu in October, has created greater opportunity for accessible prevention-based outreach and laid important groundwork for continued expansion in the years ahead.

Throughout 2025, our team remained committed to disciplined, consistent delivery—strengthening internal systems, maintaining high clinical standards, and ensuring that every animal entrusted to us received compassionate and professional care. None of this would be possible without our veterinarians, medical team, admin team, volunteers, donors, and community partners who stand beside us.

Thank you for making 2025 a year of partnership, prevention, and perseverance.



We perform outreach to deserving communities in Fiji who lack access to veterinary and animal welfare services.











ANIMAL IMPACT STORY



During our regional outreach visit to the Marshall Islands, a young kitten named Marsha was brought to us with a rectal prolapse caused by severe watery diarrhea. The condition had developed only hours earlier, and without immediate treatment, it could have become life-threatening.

Working alongside our partners at RMI Love Animals, and through relationships strengthened under The Pacific Island Animal Advocacy Alliance (TPIAAA), our team acted quickly in a resource-limited setting to treat her. The prolapse was successfully corrected, and Marsha made a strong recovery. Her caregiver was guided ongoing care to support healing.

Marsha's story is a reminder that animal welfare challenges across the Pacific are shared and so are the solutions. Through regional collaboration, training, and support, we are building stronger local capacity so that urgent cases like Marsha's can be treated swiftly and successfully.

What 2025 Taught Us

In 2025, Animals Fiji learned that real progress is often quiet. It is found in the discipline of showing up, the courage to strengthen our systems, and the patience required for long-term change. This year deepened our understanding of what it truly takes to build sustainable animal welfare in Fiji.

CONSISTENCY SAVES MORE LIVES THAN URGENCY

In 2025, Animals Fiji didn't chase noise. We showed up — repeatedly — in communities that needed ongoing support. Impact came not from single large moments, but from steady, disciplined delivery.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP MULTIPLIES IMPACT

From donors funding outreach days to individuals driving local clinics, 2025 demonstrated that meaningful animal welfare is collaborative.

PROFESSIONALISM PROTECTS THE MISSION

As we grew, we strengthened our internal systems — governance, HR processes, accountability, and structure. Hard decisions were made and standards clarified. Sustainability requires more than compassion — it requires discipline.

RESILIENCE IS BUILT QUIETLY


Behind every surgery, adoption, and outreach clinic was a team that showed up — even when it was hard. 2025 was not defined by one headline moment, but by endurance.

PREVENTION IS HARDER — AND MATTERS MORE

Whether through desexing outreach, microchipping advocacy, or public education, 2025 reinforced that long-term change requires patience and trust.

Bella arrived at Animals Fiji with more than 38 puncture wounds after being attacked while her owners were overseas and she was in the care of another individual. Her injuries were severe and required intensive treatment, including daily wound care to prevent infection and support healing.

Over the following weeks, Bella slowly regained her strength. With dedicated veterinary care and the support of her family, she made a remarkable recovery and was able to return home.

Bella's case also highlights a broader challenge in animal welfare. Many incidents of cruelty go unreported or unresolved, often because communities wish to avoid conflict. Strengthening awareness and confidence to speak up for animals remains an important part of preventing harm.

Today, Bella is back with her family — safe, loved, and wagging her tail once again.

Community Outreach in Action




In 2025, Animals Fiji continued expanding veterinary outreach to communities with limited access to animal care. One example was a two-day visit to Vunavutu Village near Sigatoka, where strong local leadership and community engagement made the outreach especially impactful.

During the visit, 37 animals were desexed (32 dogs and 5 cats), helping reduce unwanted litters and support long-term dog population management. The team also provided 44 livestock consultations, including horses, cows, goats, and pigs. Animals received health checks, deworming, and hoof care where needed.



The success of the outreach reflected the commitment of the village itself. Community members Jacinta Tuitoga and her husband Sireli helped initiate the visit and worked closely with village leaders to coordinate animals for care.

The positive response has already created ripple effects — neighbouring villages have since requested similar outreach visits, demonstrating how community partnerships can extend the impact of veterinary services across Fiji.

Reaching Communities

Animals Fiji works not only through clinical care, but through education, community engagement, and regional collaboration that strengthens animal welfare across Fiji and the Pacific.

EDUCATION & AWARENESS

RESCUE READERS

In partnership with International School Nadi, the Rescue Reader Programme invites students to read aloud to shelter animals, building confidence in animals while fostering empathy, literacy, and responsible pet care.

SCHOOL VISITS

Our team visited schools in Malolo Island and Savusavu, engaging students in responsible pet ownership and animal welfare.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Monthly community engagement providing animal welfare advice, basic care products, and adoption awareness.


SUPPORTING THE FIJI CANCER SOCIETY

ANIMAL IMPACT STORY



In the remote hills of Wainikoro in Macuata Province, a farmer urgently called for help when his cow developed a severe vaginal prolapse during late pregnancy.

Initial treatment had been attempted the previous day, but with limited veterinary resources across large rural areas, the situation worsened and further intervention was needed. Our Northern Division veterinary team travelled to the farm to assess the emergency.

Led by Veterinary Graduate Navneel and supported by the Animals Fiji Northern team, the case required hours of careful fieldwork under challenging conditions. Although the calf could not be saved, the cow's life was preserved — protecting an important livelihood for the farmer and his family.



Cases like this highlight the realities of rural veterinary care in Fiji. Long distances, limited infrastructure, and complex emergencies mean farmers often rely on Animals Fiji's veterinary teams for urgent support.

With the largest veterinary team in the country and clinics operating across multiple divisions, Animals Fiji continues to provide critical veterinary expertise for companion animals, livestock, and wildlife throughout Fiji.

VETERINARY TRAINING & MENTORSHIP

Through structured placements and mentorship, including partnerships with VetProjects International, Animals Fiji provides hands-on clinical training for veterinary graduates and professionals from Fiji and around the world.



ANIMAL IMPACT STORY

Romeo was rescued in April 2025 after enduring years of neglect in Sigatoka, where a metal chain had been embedded in his neck for an estimated two to three years. His case sparked national attention and was raised in Parliament, highlighting the urgent need to enforce Fiji's Protection of Animals Act. Legal proceedings relating to his abuse remain before the courts.

While his physical wounds healed, the psychological trauma of prolonged chaining and pain proved far more complex. Despite careful management, Romeo exhibited escalating aggression, resulting in serious bite incidents involving staff.

Recognising our responsibility to both animal welfare and public safety, Animals Fiji sought international consultation with canine aggression specialist Dr. Jim Crosby.



Following assessment, humane euthanasia was determined to be the safest and most responsible course of action.

Romeo's story is heartbreaking. It is also a reminder that cruelty leaves lasting scars — not only on the body, but on the mind. Prevention, responsible ownership, and enforcement of animal protection laws remain critical to ensuring animals do not suffer beyond recovery.

Research & Innovation

In 2025, Animals Fiji continued to lead evidence-based animal welfare research, combining community insights and veterinary science to design humane and sustainable solutions.

ADVANCING VETERINARY RESEARCH IN FIJI & THE PACIFIC

Animals Fiji contributed to a peer-reviewed heartworm study published in the Preventive Veterinary Medicine Journal, co-authored by our Animals Fiji team **Casey Quimby** and **Dr. Ashmita Datt** and led by Dr. Peter Atkinson (University of Adelaide).

The study used Bayesian modelling to assess the accuracy of point-of-care heartworm tests in Fijian dogs, suitable for resource-limited settings. Findings revealed that around **30%** of dogs tested were positive for heartworm.

LEADING EVIDENCE-BASED DOG POPULATION MANAGEMENT

Animals Fiji returned to Tavakubu, Lautoka, to build on research conducted in 2023. In 2025, we completed **309 household surveys** and **4 street dog counts**. Our research aims to:

- ✓ **Track real change** in dog population size, health, and ownership practices over time.
- ✓ **Identify** root causes of overpopulation.
- ✓ **Design targeted, evidence-based** dog population management strategies.

Our findings are already guiding **collaboration with town councils** and the **Ministry of Agriculture & Waterways** to ensure dog population management strategies are locally relevant.

Animals Fiji also launched **two national surveys** with community members and experts involved in dog population management. The surveys aim to identify best-practice dog population management programs and key barriers to participation.

STRENGTHENING IMPACT ACROSS FIJI: FUTURE RESEARCH

In 2026, we are expanding our research across Fiji, starting with baseline data collection in **Savusavu** in January and continuing in **Labasa**, collaborating with town councils to support ongoing community outreach.





What began as a routine desexing during our outreach and trap–neuter–return (TNR) visit to Blue Lagoon Beach Resort soon became an unexpected adventure when Ginger went missing. Resort staff searched for two days before he was found — just as our team was about to board the boat — and the procedure was completed in the departure lounge.

Months later, while staying at the resort, Jennifer and her husband fell in love with the friendly cat who had taken over their bure. Struggling with other resident cats on the island, relocation became a positive welfare outcome. With the support of the Blue Lagoon team, they adopted him, and in June Ginger was safely exported to join his new family overseas.

Ginger’s journey reflects the full circle of our work — outreach, prevention, partnership, adoption, and responsible export, preserving the human–animal bond while reducing the risk of abandonment.



Total Expenses FJ \$1,742,825*



SUBSIDISED SERVICES VS CLIENT FEES



Animals Fiji operates on a highly subsidised service model to ensure veterinary care remains accessible to communities across Fiji.

KEY FINANCIAL INSIGHTS:

- **Accessible veterinary care:** 35.7% of expenditure subsidised treatment, ensuring animals receive care regardless of financial circumstances.
- **Our people deliver the mission:** Skilled veterinarians, nurses, and support staff make Animals Fiji's work possible. 41.2% of expenses support teams delivering care and outreach across Fiji.
- **Direct animal care:** Nearly half of total spending supported subsidised veterinary services and essential medical treatment.
- **Growing demand:** A 25% increase in animals helped reflects rising community need for accessible veterinary care.

Regional Collaboration:

THE PACIFIC ISLAND ANIMAL ADVOCACY ALLIANCE

Strengthening animal welfare collaboration across Pacific Island communities.

2025 marked the formation of the Pacific Islands Animal Advocacy Alliance (TPIAAA), a regional network bringing together organisations working to strengthen animal welfare across the Pacific.


The alliance was developed through collaboration between regional partners, with Animals Fiji playing a key role in convening early discussions alongside veterinary researcher Dr. Jessica Hoopes. TPIAAA supports knowledge sharing, coordinated advocacy, and regional collaboration on issues such as humane dog population management, improved access to veterinary services, and protection of vulnerable wildlife species.

By connecting organisations and professionals across Pacific island communities, the alliance aims to support sustainable, locally driven solutions that improve animal welfare across the region.

Lisi, now 11 years old, was originally adopted from Animals Fiji as a puppy. This year, she returned to us with a longstanding mass on the left side of her chest.

She was still bright, alert, and eager to eat, a testament to the love and care she has received throughout her life.

Given her age, general anaesthesia carried increased risk. Our team developed a tailored plan, safely removing the mass under local anaesthesia to minimise stress and complication.

The procedure was successful, and her surgical site healed beautifully.

Lisi's case highlights an important part of our work. Many families delay treatment due to cost concerns. Animals Fiji is committed to ensuring that no animal is turned away. Through subsidised rates & additional financial assistance, we help make critical care accessible..

Thoughtful care and community support can give animals a second chance, at any age.

Looking Ahead

BUILDING THE FUTURE OF ANIMAL WELFARE IN FIJI

As Animals Fiji continues to grow, our focus for 2026 is expanding veterinary access, strengthening community partnerships, and advancing evidence-based animal population management across Fiji and the Pacific.

EXPANDING VETERINARY OUTREACH

In 2026, Animals Fiji will deliver outreach services to Labasa for the first time, expanding access to veterinary care for communities in Fiji's Northern Division.

ADVANCING RESEARCH & DATA


In January 2026, our team began the first phase of new community data collection in Savusavu, helping us better understand pet ownership practices and guide future dog population management strategies.

COMMUNITY ONE-HEALTH OFFICERS

Animals Fiji is working toward establishing Community One-Health Officers — local champions who will support responsible pet ownership, connect communities with veterinary services, and strengthen the link between animal welfare, public health, and community wellbeing.

STRENGTHENING NATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

Through collaboration with the Ministry of Agriculture & Waterways, town and city councils, and regional partners, Animals Fiji aims to deliver more outreach clinics and community engagement initiatives than ever before.
